HOUSING POLICY

Because living in the residence hall is such an important part of a student's college experience, *all freshman and sophomore students (defined as less than 60 credit hours) are required to live in a University residence hall.*

RESIDENT ASSISTANTS

Living on campus connects you with an outstanding support system, including our Student Life staff. You will have a Resident Assistant on your floor who will hold floor meetings, plan activities, answer questions, and help you have the best college experience possible.





ASSISTANT COMPLEX DIRECTOR

Each residence hall is staffed with several Assistant Complex Directors (ACDs). The ACD is a graduate student who lives in the hall and may advise student government, supervise the information desk staff, coordinate building repairs, supervise RAs, and coordinate activities in the halls.

COMPLEX DIRECTOR

Each residence hall is supervised by one Complex Director (CD). The CD is a full-time staff member and is responsible for and supervises all other staff members in the residence hall, as well as see that the residence hall is a supportive environment for all students.

FYE PROGRAM

The purpose of the First Year Experience program at Western Illinois University is to help first year students make a successful transition to college from their previous educational or life experience. Freshman students are housed with other students on FYE floors.





Western Illinois University Housing provides a variety of live-in options for first-year and upper-division students.

First-Year Halls

Lincoln, Washington, and Thompson Halls house both first-year and upper-divison students, with first-year students being housed on their own floor with other first-year students. These are known as **First Year Experience** or FYE floors.

Upper-Division Halls

Corbin, Olson, and Caroline Grote halls house upper-division students only.


ROOMMATE MATCHING SYSTEM

What you will need for your Housing Application:

- Your WIU Email Address
- Your Community Preference: This is where you will indicate if you are interested in a living-learning community, or specific building (if transferring with 30+ credit hours).
- Your Roommate Preference: If you know someone you would like to live with, you will need their name and 9-digit WIU ID number. Otherwise, after you apply, you will have the option to go through our Roommate Matching System or be randomly assigned a roommate based on your lifestyle preference form.
- Housing Application Fee: When completing the online housing application, you will need to pay the \$50 non-refundable processing fee by major credit card when submitting your housing application. To pay by check, call (309) 298-3000 or e-mail us at uhds@wiu.edu at to request a housing application packet to be mailed. Cash payment only accepted in person at the UHDS office in Seal Hall.
