ABSENCES

WIU Experiences: (20 points each) Explore your new "home away from home." Participate in an on-campus activity or Macomb activity that you currently do not participate in. Take a photo of the event and include it in your write-up. Write-ups must contain the name, date, time, and host of the event, what you did at the event, and what you enjoyed and disliked about the event. A total of 8 experiences are due throughout the course (one each week).

Examples include: attend a cultural event, club meeting, try a new restaurant, participate in an activity with your floor, canoe at Spring Lake, hike at Lake Argyle, volunteer, attend a new church service, etc. Zoom events DO count, but please participate. Activities that are other assignments (i.e. the ag career fair) cannot count toward a WIU Experience.

Ag Alumni Panel: (50 points) Attend the Ag Alumni Panel on September 22 from 3-4:30 p.m. Participate by asking questions of the panelists. Write a summary about what you learned from the speakers. If your course schedule conflicts with this panel, please give me a copy of your course schedule.

Resume: (50 points) Write a reverse chronological resume outlining your skills and experiences.

WIU Career Fair: (50 points) Attend the School of Agriculture Career Fair on Wednesday, October 5, 9-12 p.m. in the University Union Grand Ballroom. Dressed professionally, visit with at least three company representatives. Write a summary about who you spoke with, which company, and what positions they have available. Is this company/position a good fit for you? Why or why not?

Guest Instagrammer for a day: (50 points) Tell others your Leatherneck story on the WIUAg Instagram account. Post a photo and caption at least 4 times on your assigned day about what you do around campus. You may include your daily routine, eating in the cafeteria, work you are doing in a lab, events around campus, buildings on campus, etc. Posts should be fun, insightful, and informative. Think about information you would want to know if you were considering attending WIU (which you just were!) Please see "Instagrammer For-a-Day Guidelines."

Mentor Assignments: (50 points each) Complete each of the mentor assignments per its individual instructions.

Mentor Paper and Presentation: (100 points) Write a final paper on the mentor program. Present on the experience in class. Additional details will be provided.

Final Project: (135 points) A summary about your plans for the future. Details will be given in class.

EXTRA CREDIT

No Stupid Questions: (5 points each) Ask a (legitimate) question at the beginning of class to help you learn more about WIU, the School of Ag, the agriculture industry or the world at large. We may not have all the answers but we can find them together.

Additional extra credit opportunities will be available throughout the course.
