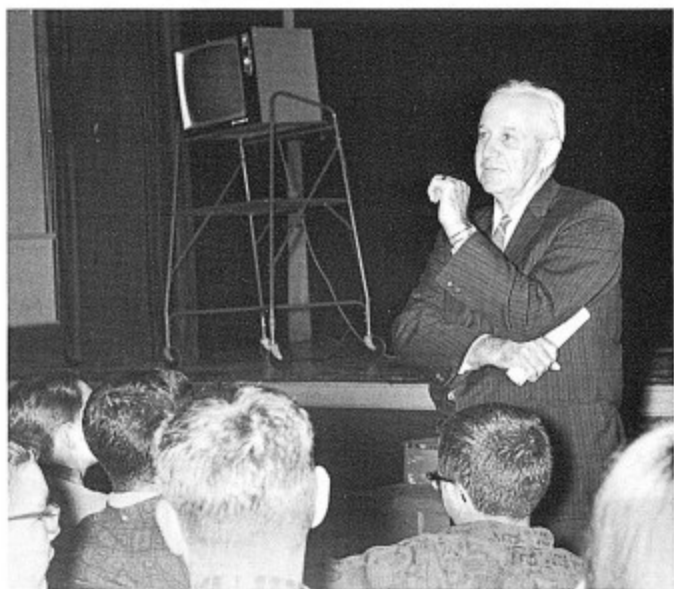

Mr. H. Waldo Horrabin, Principal of the Campus School for 17 years, figured in the news last fall. This article appeared in the Homecoming issue of the *Courier* on Wednesday, October 27, 1965.

Owes Toothpaste Success To Lab Principal Horrabin

The inventor of one of the most popular toothpastes on the market today gives a faculty member much of the credit for his success.

He is Dr. William H. Nebergall who came to WIU as a student from Cuba, Ill. He got his bachelor's degree here in education with a major in chemistry in 1936.

Nebergall is now associate professor of chemistry at Indiana University. He says his work with toothpaste did not start in Macomb, but he said that his "thorough training in fundamental chemistry" did start in Macomb.

He said royalties to the Indiana University foundation for the toothpaste has amounted to over \$300,000 thus far.

A letter to Dr. Joseph Stipanowich, head of the depart-

ment of mathematics, Dr. Nebergall said:

"I enjoyed my association with Professor Waldo Horrabin more than with any other teacher I ever had. He is a genius at human relationships.

"I am sure that he had a profound influence on the philosophy with which I wrote a textbook in general chemistry and which has been so widely adopted.

Over 45,000 copies were used in more than 330 colleges and universities last year."

The Professor Horrabin to whom he refers is now principal of WIU's campus school.

Horrabin has been with the University longer than any other faculty member since 1923.

Nebergall said he started at WIU as a mathematics major but later switched to chemistry because he was promised a job as a laboratory assistant if he did.

The toothpaste he worked with was *Crest*.

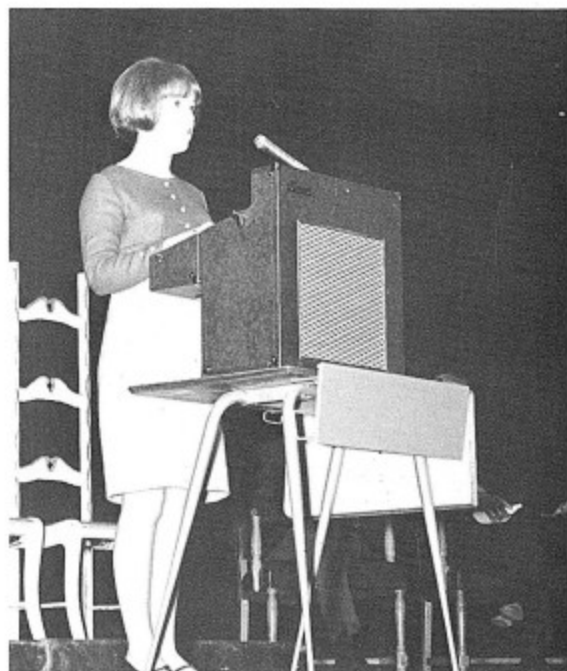

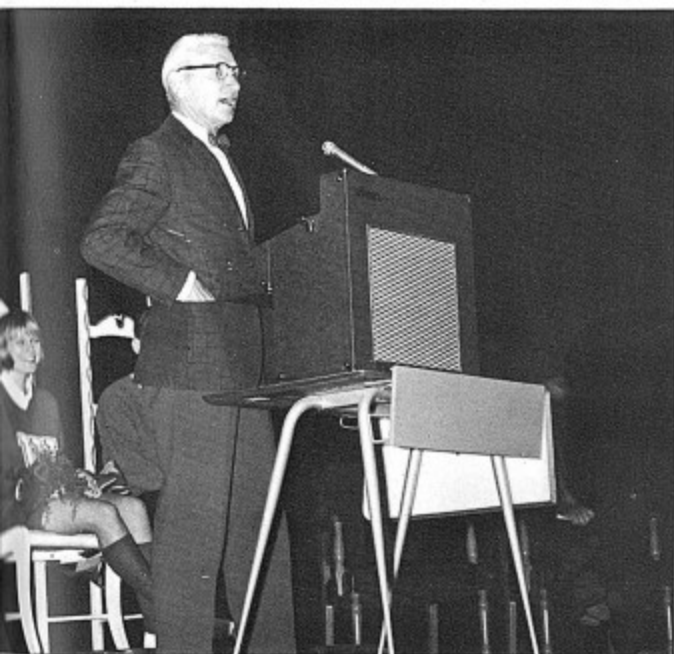

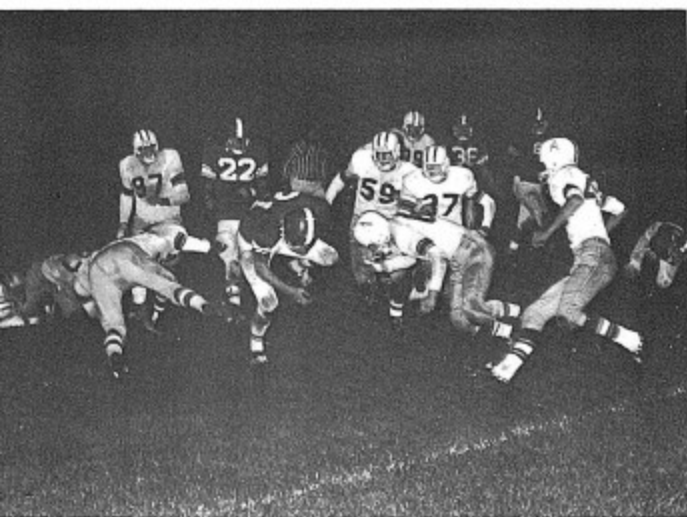

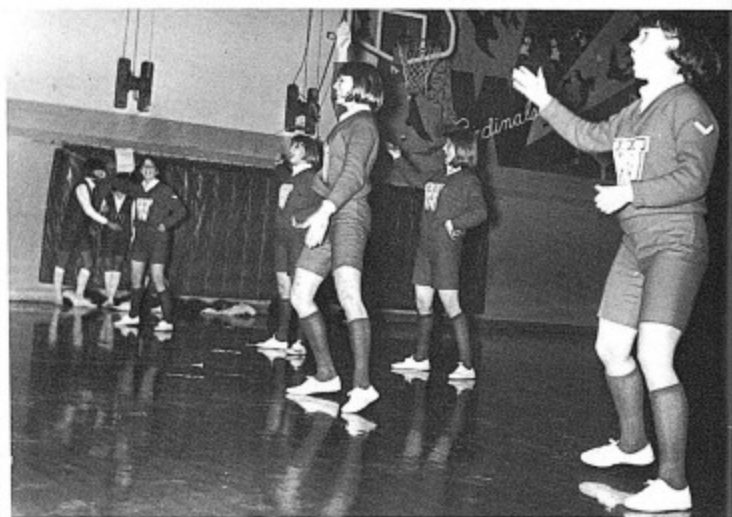


Don Cay skirts the right end while Aledo football players give chase.

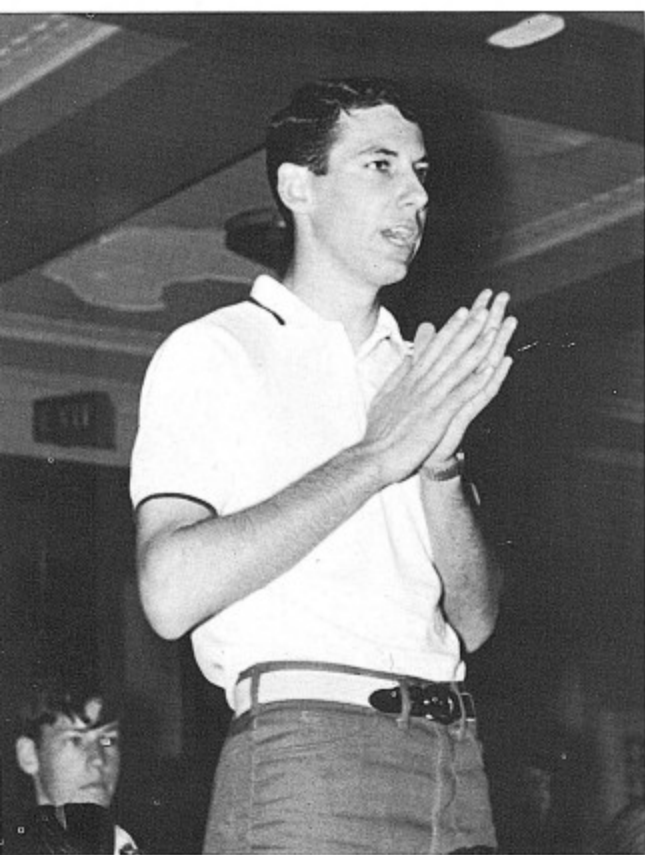

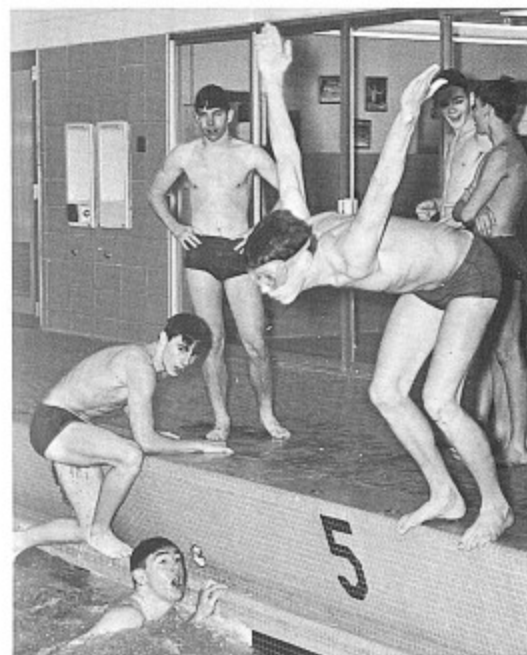

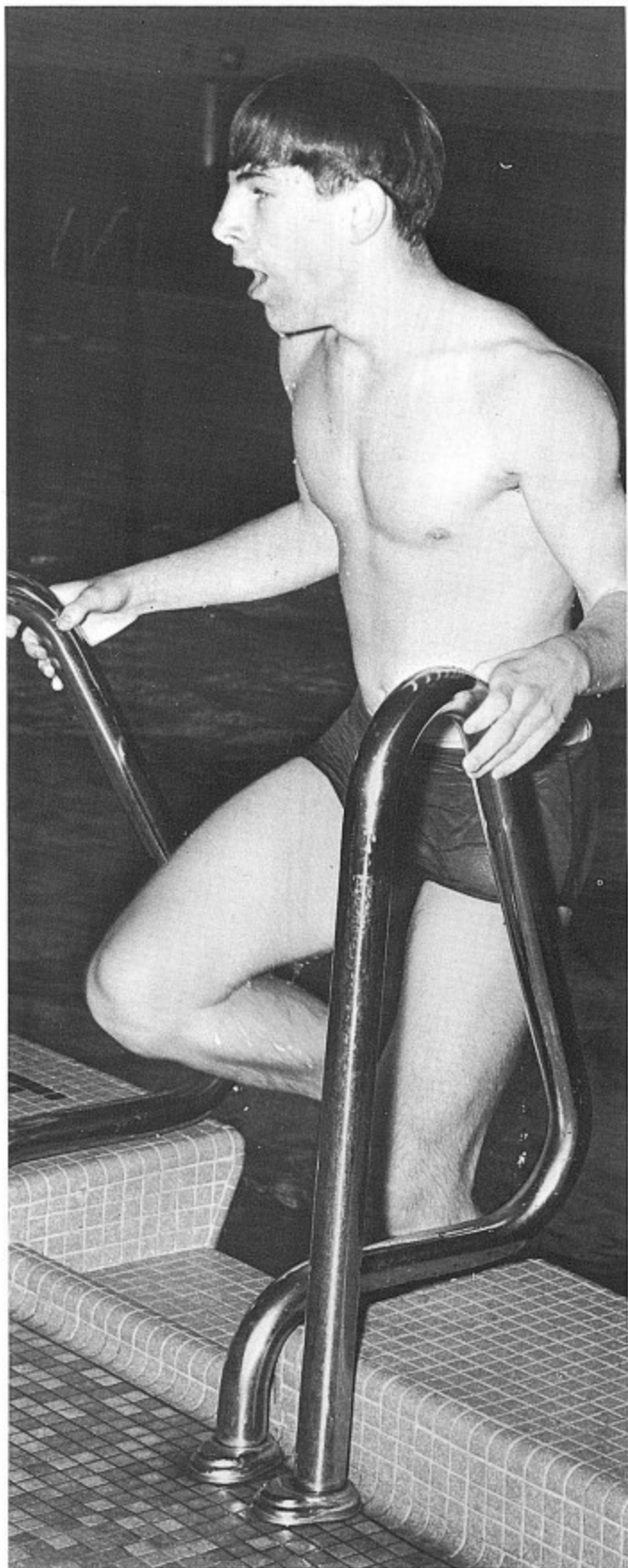

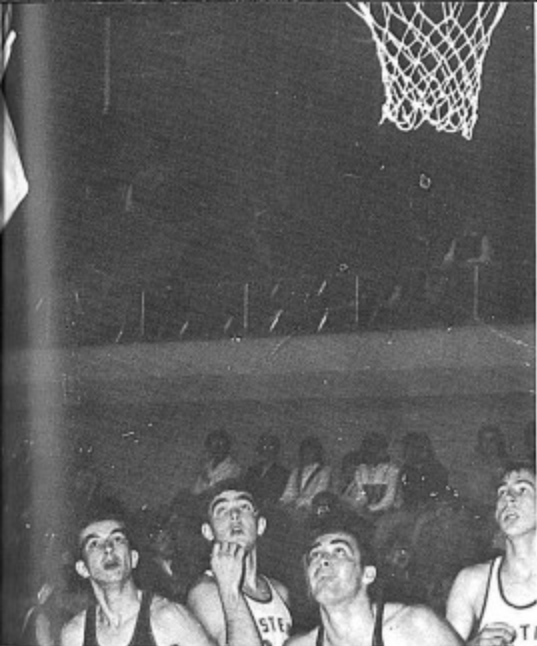

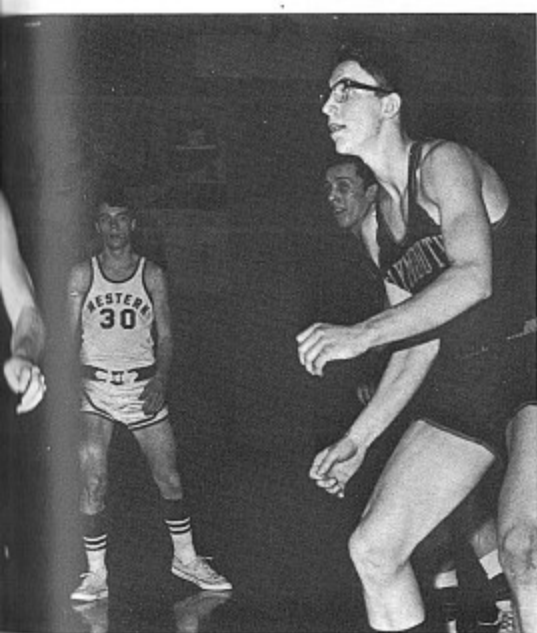

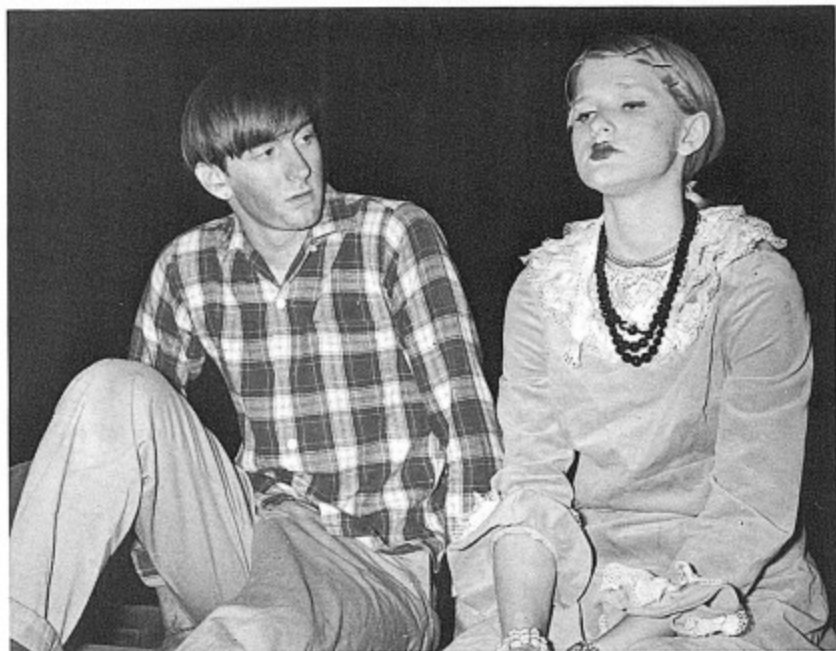

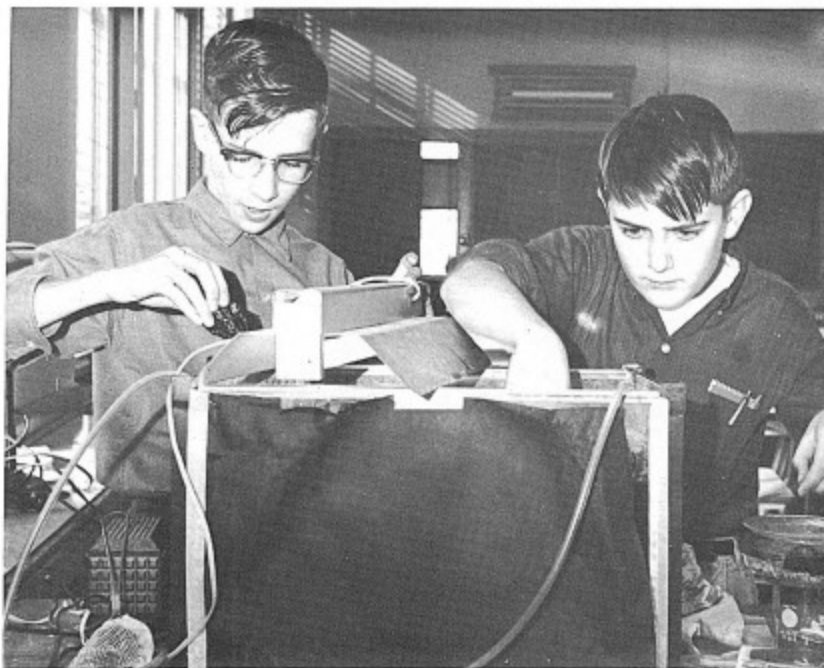

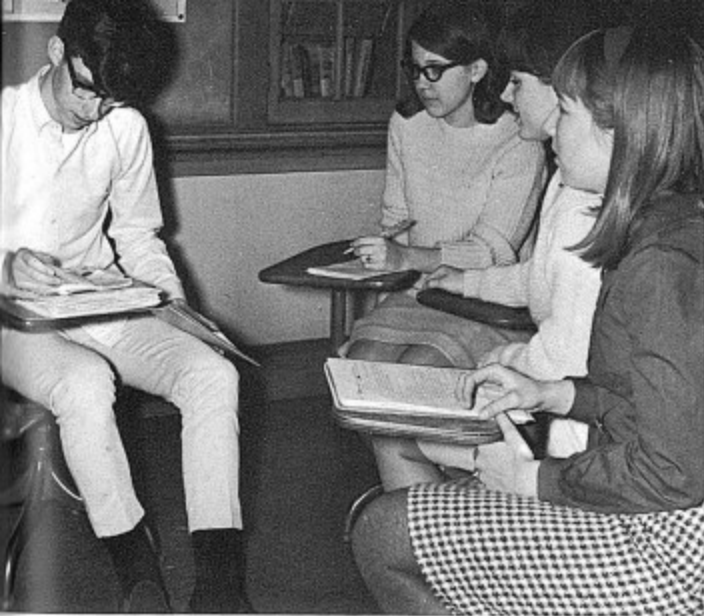

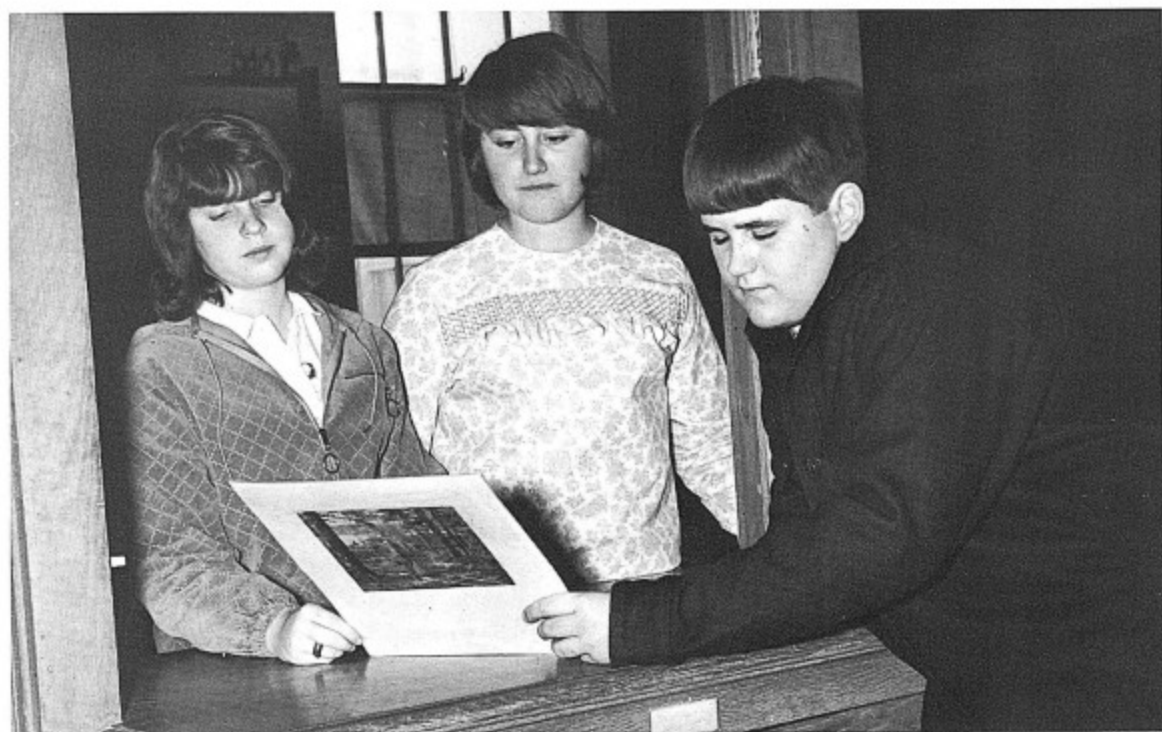

Every spring marks the completion of another school year, the departure of another senior class, and the end of many happy and proud school moments. For some, the most important memories will be those of the individual honors they received throughout the year or on awards night.

Last summer, Sara Dobson traveled to Jacksonville to participate in Girls' State while five boys, Jeff Carson, David Stiffler, Randy Perry, Ray Quintiliani, and Dick Schoeninger (whose brother Charles attended the previous year) represented Western High in Springfield at Boys' State.

During the fall Patty Nixa and Jeff Carson were chosen to reign over Homecoming festivities. Their court included Jan Deane, Sara Dobson, Ruth Nell, Mark Herbert, Ray Quintiliani, and Mike Sallee. On May 28, Sara Dobson and Steve Larson were crowned Prom Queen and King.

In the athletic field Ray Quintiliani was named the most valuable player and Mark Herbert the most improved player for the football team. Allen Fritschel received the most valuable player award for the Christmas Invitational Basketball Tournament and was voted the most valuable player for the year by his teammates.

In the area of speaking and writing, Mike Cortes placed second in the state semi-finals for the American Legion Oratorical Contest; David Stiffler won second place in the V.F.W. Voice of Democracy contest; Lois Krong was honored for her essay award

from the Illinois State Historical Society; and John Potter was chosen one of ten Illinois high school students to attend a summer research workshop for the Heart Association.

In February, Mary Gingerich, John Potter, and Dick Shelton were selected to participate in the Illinois All-State Music Organizations. In March Dick Shelton was selected as Concertmaster for the Mississippi Valley Festival Orchestra, and Sheila Wilde was selected as historian of the Illinois Section 9 Future Homemakers of America. Mary Gingerich, Dick Shelton, Mike Sallee and John Potter were chosen to represent Western High at a Science Symposium, University of Iowa. The D.A.R. and S.A.R. citizenship awards were received by Jo Burgess and Mike Sallee. Letters of commendation from the National Merit Scholarship Association were addressed to Jo Burgess, Jeff Carson, Mike Cortes, Sheryl Crane, Sue Glaza, Sue Halvorsen, and Ruth Krong.

Not only were many students honored but the faculty also received recognition. Dr. Gould received a financial grant to conduct research in music. Mr. Sockler was a featured speaker before the Illinois High School Athletic Coaches Clinic in Champaign.

Students excelled in the fields of music, sports, dramatics, and art. To name all those students and faculty who were honored in some manner throughout the year would be impossible; their achievements were not left unnoticed.

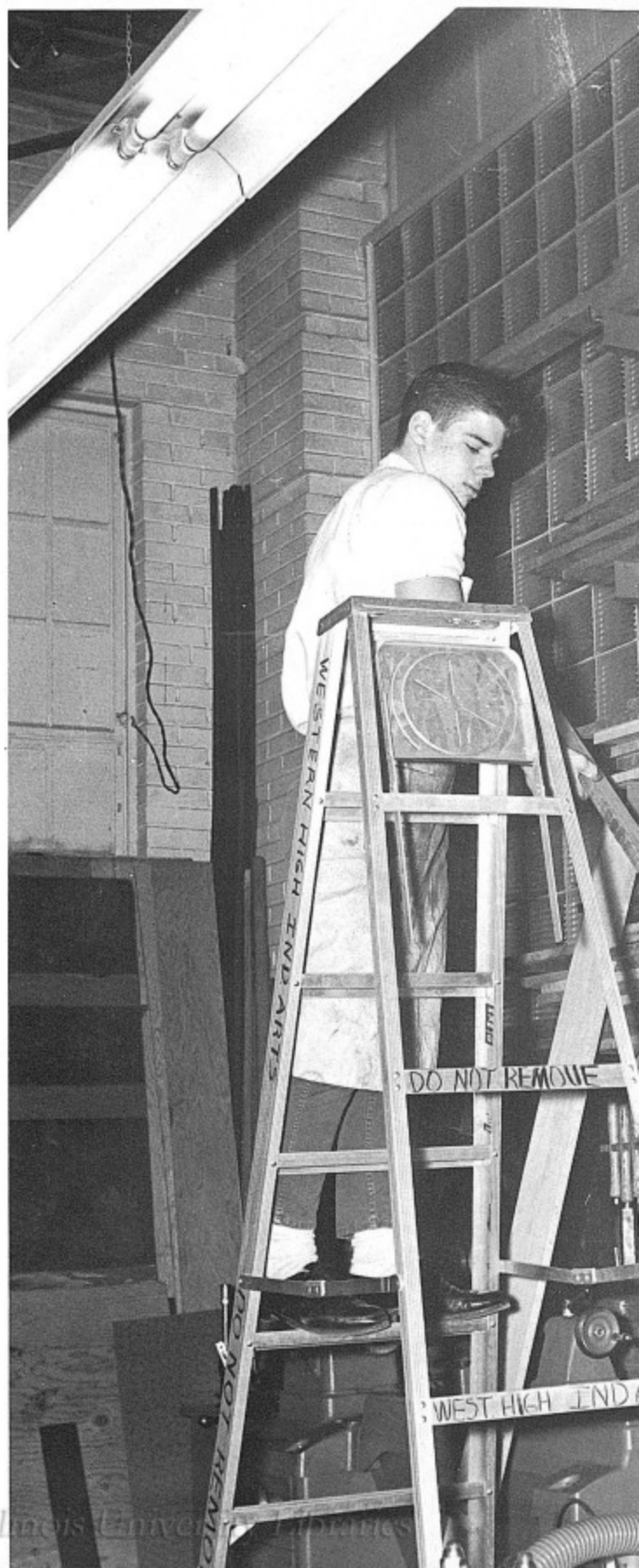


DOWN THE HALL AND Is Our Journey

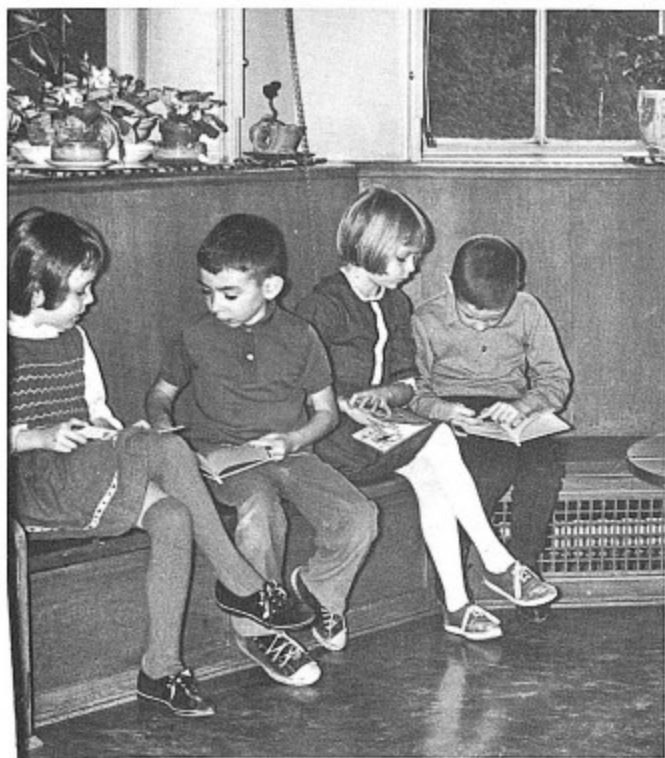

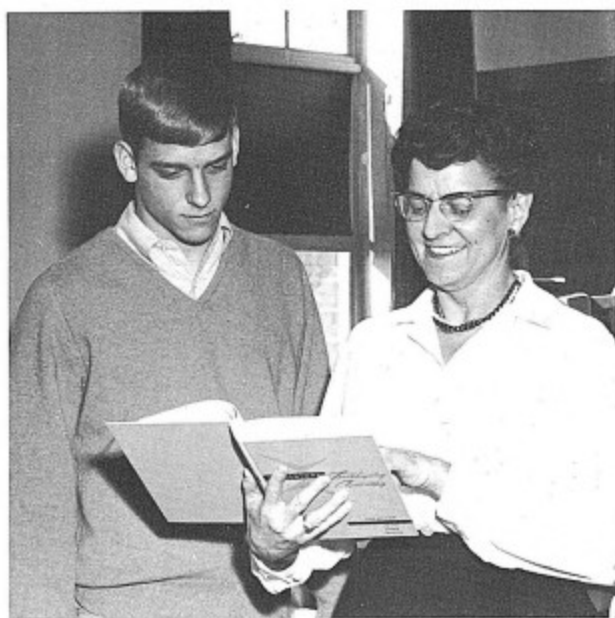

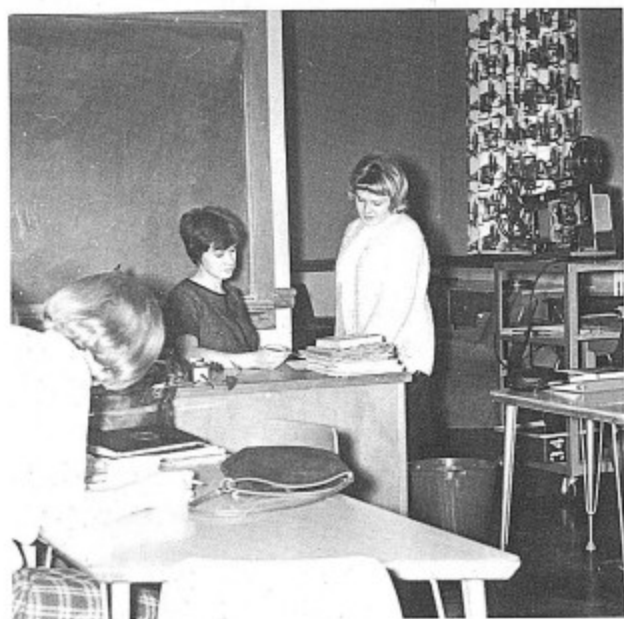

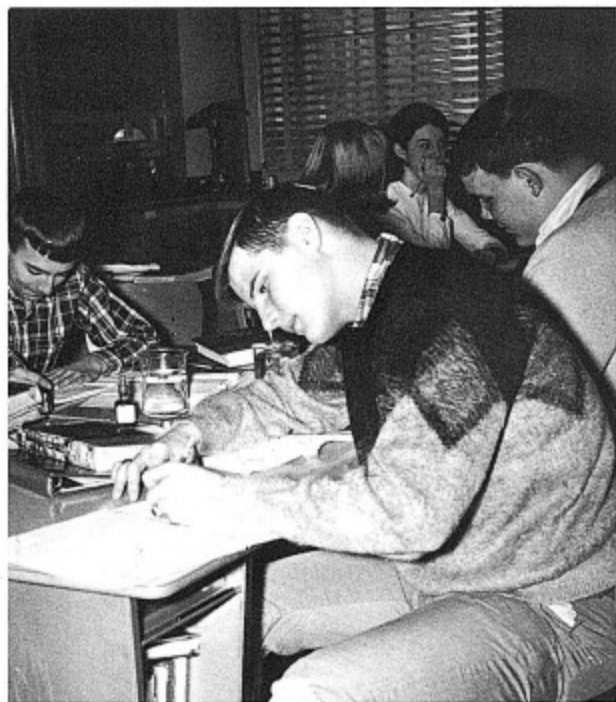

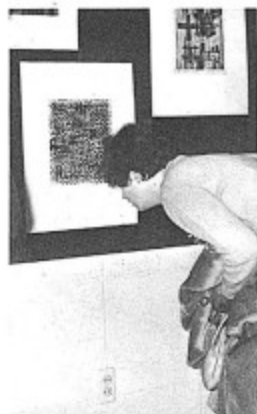

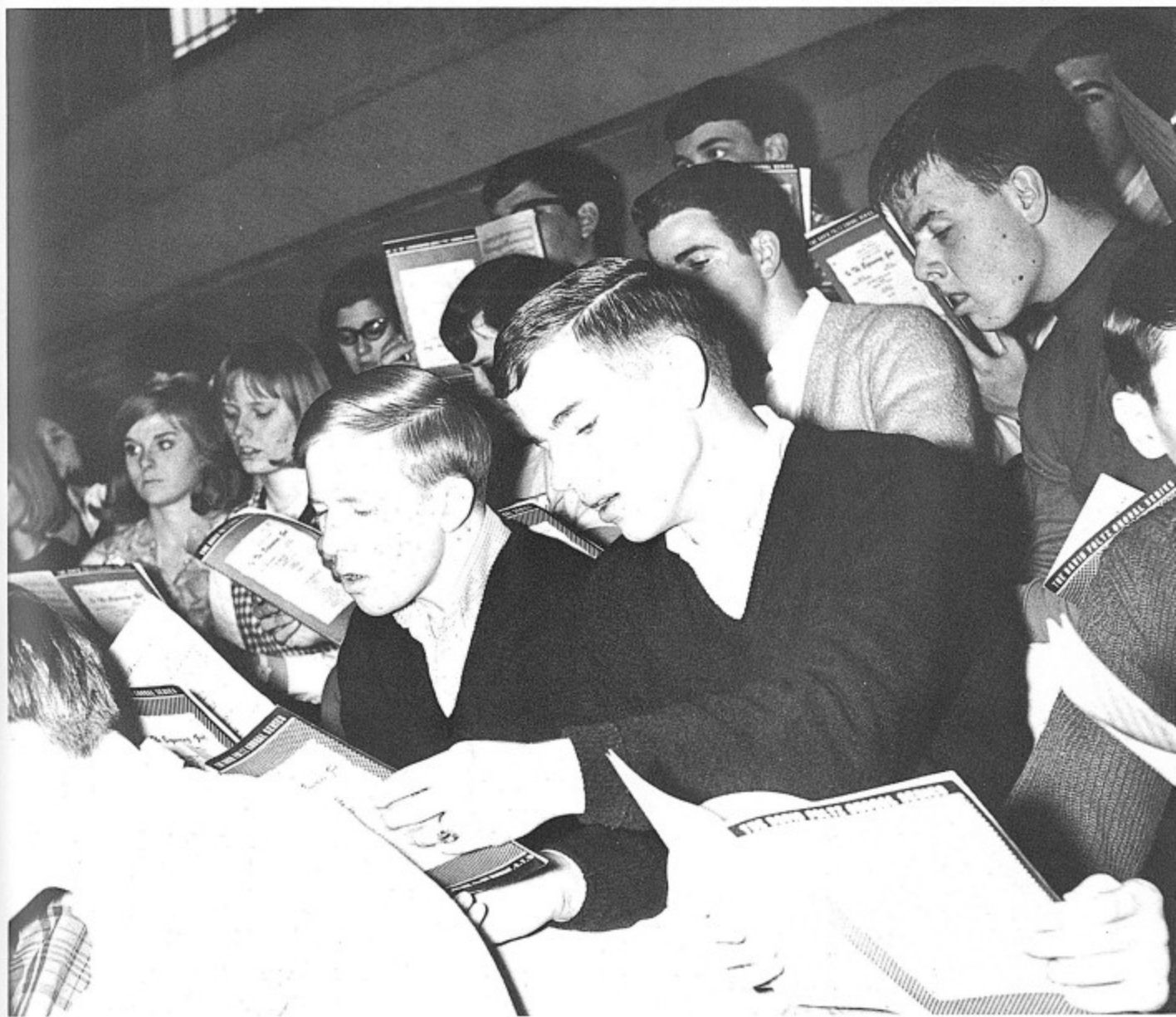

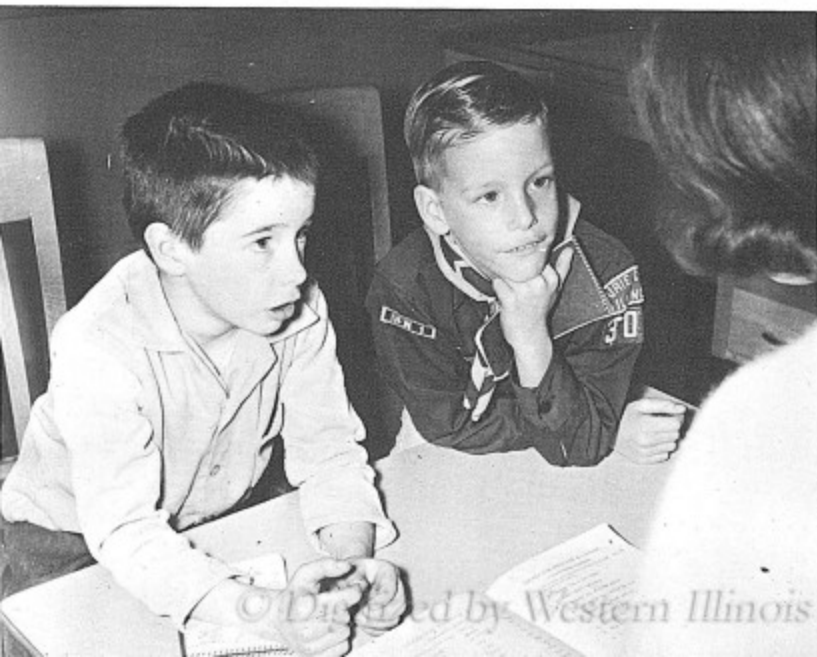

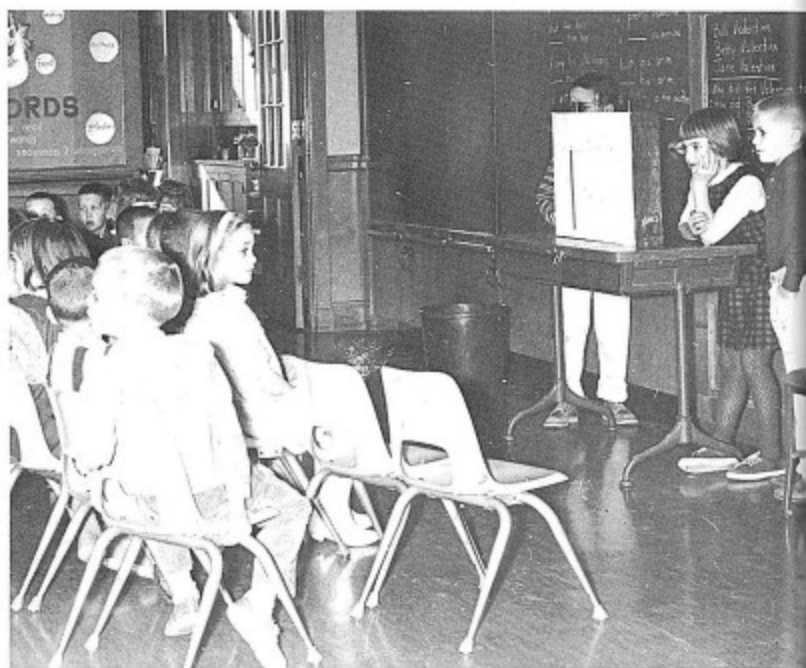

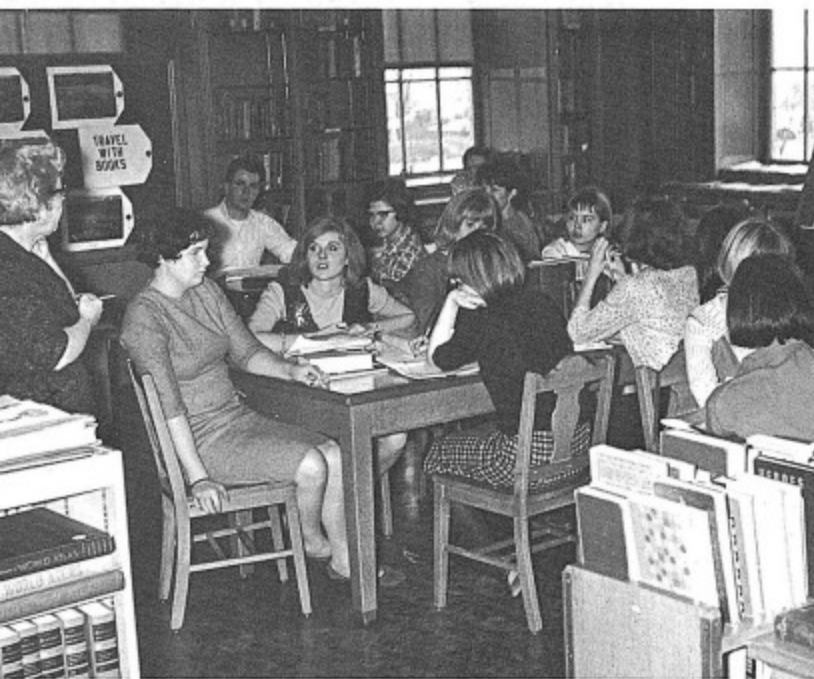

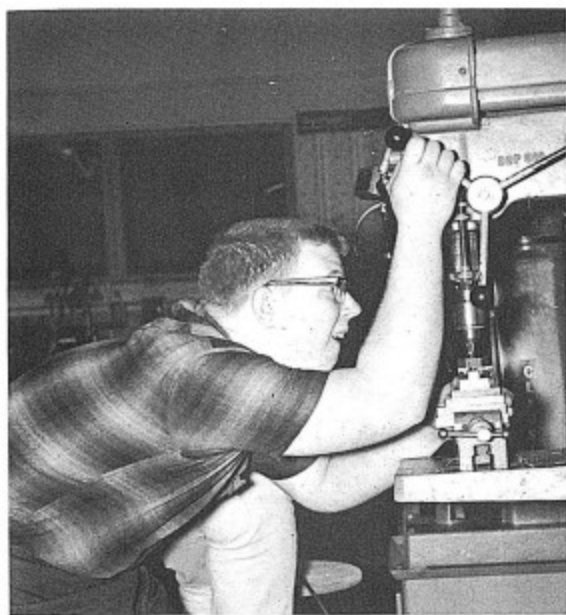

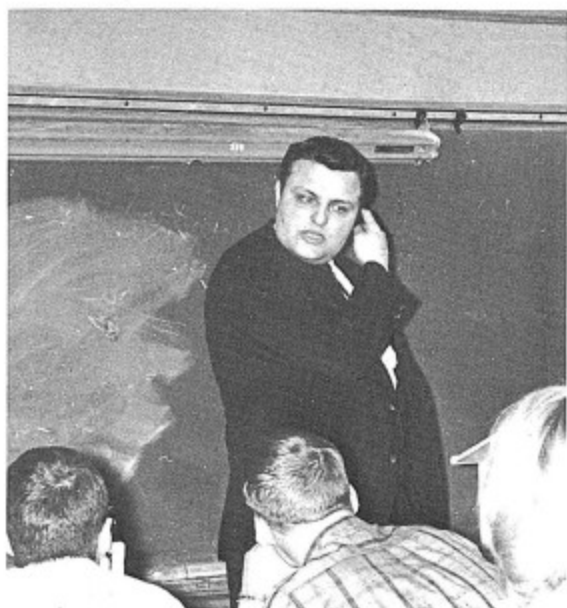

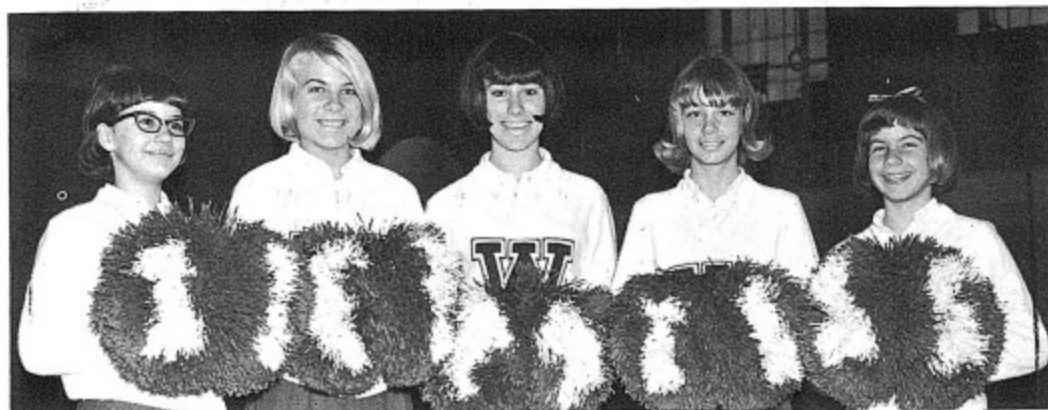

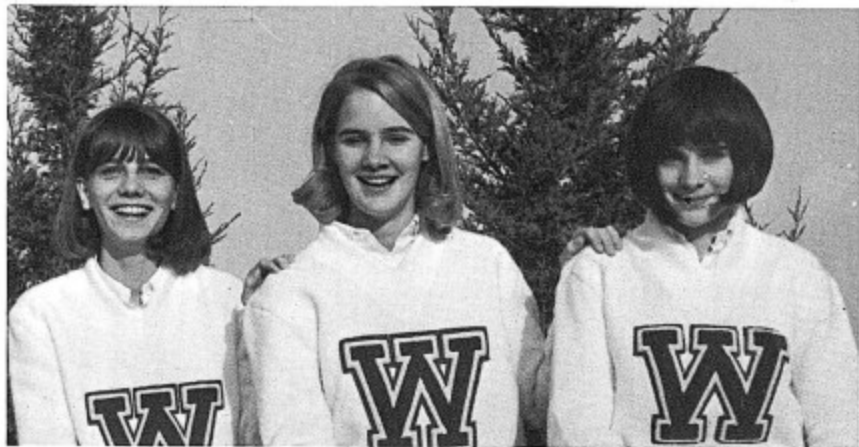

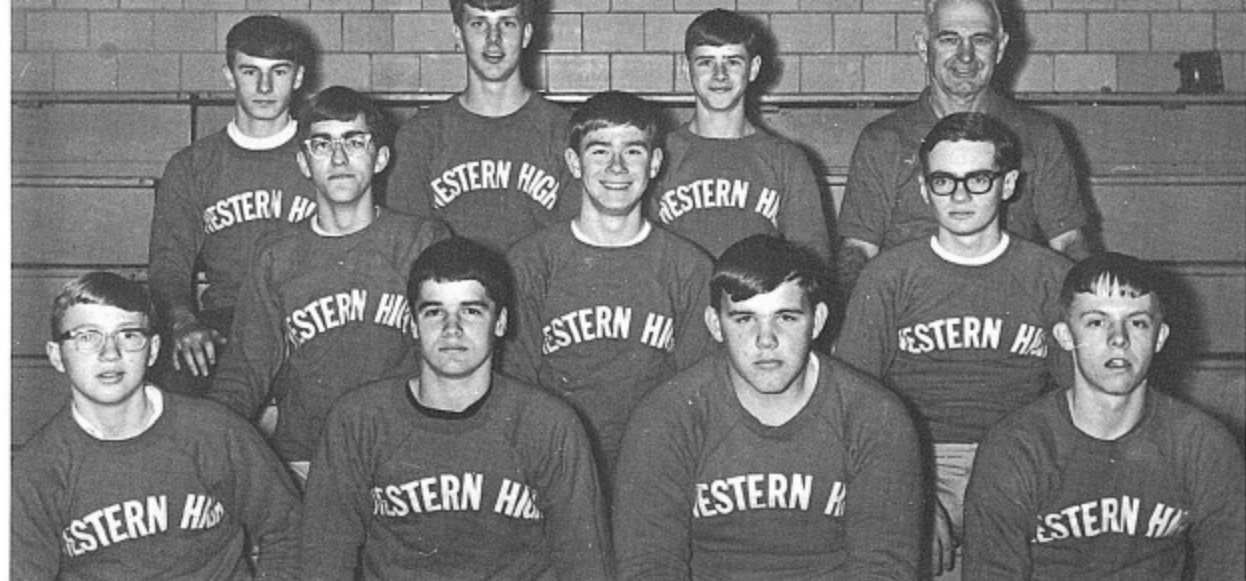
Swimming Begins Its First Year
