Admission Requirements

- **Since admission is competitive and limited, application materials must arrive at the CSP office by January 15 for guaranteed consideration. This includes the separate, but related, process of applying to the School of Graduate Studies.**
- Applicants may qualify as potential degree candidates in the College Student Personnel (CSP) program if their overall undergraduate cumulative GPA is at least 2.75 or if their last two years of undergraduate work is 3.0 or higher. These are minimum requirements, and students with lower GPAs may not be granted an interview given the competitive nature of the program.
- Applicants are required to submit three letters of reference; at least one of these must be from a faculty member who is familiar with the applicant's academic ability.
- An essay entitled "My Interest in College Student Personnel Work" will be used to assess the applicant's interest and fit in student development.
- Approximately 20 students are admitted annually to the program. Due to the sequence of courses and graduate assistantship assignments, only full-time students are normally accepted for fall semester admission. Students who want to attend on a part-time basis should consult with the program coordinator to request special consideration.
- The CSP program at Western is committed to the recruitment and selection of students throughout North America who are representative of our diverse and pluralistic society.

Degree Requirements

Students admitted to the CSP program must complete 48 semester hours (SH) of coursework, allowing two academic years to finish the degree. Thirty-three semester hours of directed coursework in CSP, an internship (6 SH), at least one practicum (2 SH), research methods (3 SH), and 4 SH of electives (selected from CSP, the behavioral sciences, business administration, counselor education, or other areas specific to career goals in consultation with adviser) are required.

Professional Affiliations and Career Opportunities

Alumni from Western Illinois University's CSP program are employed in every functional area of student affairs, and some have assumed academic responsibilities such as teaching. Our alumni find employment from coast to coast, from the smallest private institutions to the largest universities. Alumni are active in their campus community and also in professional organizations for the field. Some professional organizations that CSP students may join include Western Illinois Student Personnel Association (WISPA), National Orientation Directors Association (NODA), American College Personnel Association (ACPA), Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education (NASPA), Association of College and University Housing Officers—International (ACUHO-I), and National Association of Campus Activities (NACA).

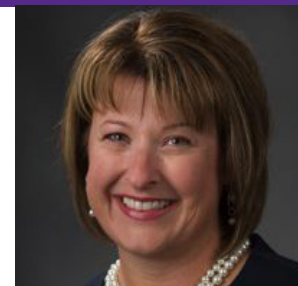
