Aaron Rodgers vs The media

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Many people know Aaron Rodgers as the three-time National Football League's most valuable player and one-time superbowl champion quarterback for the Green Bay Packers.

Aaron Rogers is widely considered by many as an all time great NFL quarterback. But it isn't Rogers' play on the field that has his name in the media this time. I personally agree with Kent here. I believe Rodgers was in the wrong for lying about having the COVID-19 vaccination.
