General Course Information

Course Description

POLSC 228 introduces undergraduate students to the field of International Relations, which seeks to understand how the peoples and countries of the world get along, as well as scientific approach to study world politics. After a brief introduction, in the first unit of the course we will study international conflict, both its origins and how it can be resolved. In the second unit, we will study major issues in international political economy, such as trade, and monetary policy. Finally, in the third unit of the course, we will discuss a variety of issues that are likely to shape the future of world politics. This section will include topics such as terrorism/counterterrorism, human rights, and environmental policy. The course as a whole should provide you not only with an understanding of how states interact with each other in the international system, but also with a knowledge of the international relations scholarship that deals with these questions. The course will be taught from a political science, rather than a policy or history, perspective. While this is not primarily a current events course, we will devote several lectures to understanding different viewpoints on a variety of relevant issues in the international system. This course will prepare you for more advanced political science courses and help you think critically and analytically about current events.

Discussion Board 20%

Participation grades will be based on your participation in the discussion board. It is total 20% of your final grade. The interactive nature of this class requires that students participate in discussion board every week for every chapter. I've created a discussion board which will have questions related to readings every day week and will provide an opportunity to everyone to engage in discussion. The discussion post will be available for a whole week and will be available every Monday at 9:00 am to Sunday 11:59 pm. No late posts will be accepted and I will be randomly responding to weekly discussions.

Homeworks 20%

Throughout the semester, you will be assigned homework to help you understand the material. Late HomeWorks could only be submitted in the case of a medical excuse or verified personal emergency. In order to be able to take a make-up exam, you must plan for it ahead of time. Under no other circumstances will there be make-up exams

Response Memo 10%

During the semester we will be discussing scholarly article. Throughout the semester you must submit one (1) response memo. Memo for a particular topic of your choice will be due in that particular week. Keep in mind that once we have discussed a topic, you may no longer write a memo on that topic (and, due to the nature of this assignment, no late memos will be accepted). All memos must be a maximum length of two (2) double-spaced pages, with standard margins and 11 or 12 size fonts (Arial, Times New Roman, or Calibri). Memos must be turned in as a hard copy (not e-mailed) at the beginning of class. Note that memos must address the research question, how the research fills the gap in the existing literature, what is the theoretical argument and what are the findings of the study. Memos that do not address the readings will be penalized
