Using the Student Organization Center (SOC)

The goal of the Student Organization Center (SOC) in the end is to serve the interests and needs of Western Illinois University's (WIU) student organizations. Within the SOC there are 17 student organizations with offices, three of those are from the Greek Community, Interfraternity Council (IFC), Panhellenic Council (PHC) and the United Greek Council (UGC). While the SOC strives to provide resources for these organizations and those they represent, there are also ways for those three organizations to use the SOC to their own benefit.

First, let us consider the resources available to members of the Greek Life community. The SOC provides office space, a phone line, computers and

leadership resources to not only Greeks in the SOC but the other organizations as well. There is a graduate student in the SOC (that's me!) available to help organizations

with any number of issues or problems that they may be facing. This includes but is not limited to: understanding University policy, team building, transitioning of leadership and conflict management.

The SOC also offers more pragmatic resources to Greek Life, as in space to meet and recruit students. In the past the different councils have used the SOC for recruitment events, interest meetings, committee meetings, as well as other various types of gatherings. The SOC Conference room can be scheduled for executive board meetings.

Enough about resources provided to the organizations and leaders in the SOC, what can they do? Well, the SOC gives students a unique opportunity to be civically engaged and exposed to a diverse body of students. It is a space to meet and work with other student organizations that represent different populations of students. There is no office or space on campus that houses more diverse populations than the SOC. This may be the most important aspect of SOC, that it gives students an opportunity to work with someone or some organization that is different for them.

The SOC also provides a venue where Greek Life can be a role model to the campus community. By participating civically and being active
